Mark your calendar for Friday, **April 26, 2013**. This is a career fair for graduating students and alumni seeking permanent positions in the fields of Education and Nonprofits. Regarding Education, in addition to teachers, this can mean accountants, human resources and computer techs. The primary interviewing season for teachers is spring semester when school districts actively recruit. Educators interested in careers in education will have opportunities to interview with potential employers during this event in the Student Union Memorial Center

For students interested in a career in the nonprofit sector, this is a broad field with opportunities across the board. Oftentimes, working in nonprofits can offer opportunities for students and recent college graduates to stretch career-wise in ways that are not readily available in the more structured environments common to large corporations. The nonprofit sector includes organizations that work to fill gaps left by government and business sectors by directly or indirectly working with communities.

The nonprofit sector is comprised of organizations working towards a better world, as defined by each of these organizations' missions. Within the nonprofit sector, organizations have missions that directly contrast with one another — for example organizations on opposing sides of social or environmental issues. Work for a green future: Become an Environment America fellow !

Environment America works to advance the environmental vision and values we share—clean energy, clean water, wilderness and wildlife protection, healthy food and sustainable agriculture, and more. With nearly 100 professional staff, more than 1 million members, activists and allies, and affiliates in 29 states, we organize the support it takes to stand up to polluting industries and ultimately sweep past them.

Qualifications

We're seeking candidates ready to commit themselves to fighting for the environment. Being a fellow is not for everybody. It's tough, demanding and the challenges never stop. We look for smarts, leadership experience, top-notch written and verbal skills and an eagerness to learn. We value experience organizing, including building campus groups.

Placement

We're accepting applications with our state affiliates across the country and in Washington, D.C. We accept applications on a rolling basis. Most fellowships begin in August, though a limited number are available throughout the year. You can apply through Environment America or directly with one of our state affiliates. If you're flexible, you can apply for multiple positions in multiple locations.

Salary and benefits

As a fellow with Environment America or one of our state affiliates, you'll earn \$23,750-\$24,000 in your first year and \$24,500-\$25,500 in your second year. You'll be eligible to join our group health plan at no cost to you. You'll accrue two weeks of paid vacation over the course of your first year, and three weeks in your second year. You'll be eligible to apply for college loan assistance after your third month, and to participate in our 401(k) plan at the end of your first year. Salary and benefits vary in California and New York.

STUDENT FAQ

QUESTION: If I take classes outside the UA to fulfill degree requirements will they calculate into my UA grade point average (GPA)?

ANSWER: Students' GPA is based on UA classes only, so the answer is no. However, there is a policy that the very last class taken in absentia (last class only) to fulfill degree requirements can apply to the UA GPA. It must be pre-approved by the advisor and graduation services advisor. Students must earn a minimum of a C grade in the transfer class in order for it to transfer to the UA and fulfill the requirement. It is important that students meet with their academic advisor to verify that the class they plan to take will transfer and fulfill the appropriate requirement. Students can fill out a Transfer Credit pre-approval form that can be found at:

This will verify that the class will transfer. It is important that students fill it out especially if they are completing a course outside Arizona. For in-state equivalencies students can refer to: <http://www.aztransfer.com/aztransfer/index.html> (from there select "Course Equivalency Guide"
