About CALS scholarships: Between January 1 and April 1, 2023, students applied to be considered for 2023-2024 (Fall 2023 and Spring 2023) CALS scholarships. Students submit one application to get their foot in the door for all CALS scholarships, and then they are matched to each scholarship based on each scholarship's criteria.

CALS Scholarships Quick Stats


1,127 students applied for 2023-2024 CALS scholarships. This is **29%** of our CALS student body.

million in scholarships every academic year.


98% of available CALS scholarship funds were awarded last year. Average across the university: 77%.

Our outreach efforts pay off: More students are applying for CALS scholarships.





Also increasing: Scholarship applicants as a % of the CALS student body.



Who made up our applicant pool? A look at demographics.










Key Takeaway:

About 14% of our scholarships require financial need. Let's encourage our students to file a FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) if they are eligible to do so. 


Timeline and When Students Apply






Which majors saw the most applicants for CALS scholarships?

Student Feedback on Our Application Process

After students submitted their CALS General Scholarship application, they were asked to Participate in an optional experience survey. The response rate was 22%. n=248

On average, students took **66 minutes** to write their personal statement.

63% used the "Writing Your Personal Statement" guide published by CAS.

On average, students took 98

minutes to complete the entire application process (personal statement, resume, matching questions).


82% used the "How to Apply for CALS Scholarships" master guide published by CAS.

73% already had a **resume** ready to go for their application.


15% utilized our CALS Career Center to create a new resume or update their existing document.

64% said their application process felt more efficient this year than previous years. 31% were neutral.



Not only is the scholarship money going towards my educational pursuits of becoming a Vet, but it is also helping me, on a more personal level, prove to myself and to my family that dreams can become a reality through hard work, persistence, and passion.

In the future, I hope to pursue a career in social work specifically in the field of childhood development and welfare. I want to leave a mark on the world in any way I can, and I believe that enabling children to grow and flourish in safe homes is a great way to do that. Having a fair start to life is so important for anyone's success and giving that to children defines my own success in a way.

My long-term goal is to make fashion more accessible to people with disabilities. As a Retailing and Consumer Science major at the University of Arizona, one of my many goals and aspirations is to make the retail experience more inclusive.
