# Course Description

In this 10-week course you will learn and apply features of English pronunciation that will enhance your clarity in the classroom. The primary focus of the course will be on the use of prosodic features such as intonation, sentence and word stress, and thought grouping to reinforce and clarify your message. You will also learn and use the features of the standard U.S. English vowel system, as well as additional strategies for reinforcing communication with your students. You will have the opportunity to apply what you learn to microteaching activities that simulate classroom conditions.

### Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, participants will be able to:

- Apply English intonation, stress, and thought grouping patterns strategically, to enhance the comprehensibility of classroom speech
- Differentiate the vowels of U.S. English, and produce them accurately in the appropriate contexts
- Use organizational cues to structure the information in an academic lecture
- Employ pronunciation compensation strategies to improve comprehensibility and repair miscommunication
